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Arienne M. Dwyer (Ph.D. in Altaic and Chinese Linguistics, U Washington, 1996) is chair of the current Digital Tools Summit in Linguistics organizing committee and Assistant Professor of Linguistic Anthropology at the University of Kansas, with formal affiliations with the Departments of Linguistics and Indigenous Nations Studies. She has conducted nearly 20 years of fieldwork on Turkic-Mongolic-Sinitic-Tibetic language contact in Inner and Central Asia and has directed a number of cooperative documentation and archiving projects, including on Salar (1991-1993, Fulbright), Kazakh (1993, Fulbright), Uyghur dialectology (2002-2003, ACLS), Uyghur linguistic ideologies (2005-2006), Salar, Monguor, and Wutun (2000-2005 VW-DOBES, 2005-2006 NSF), Kyrgyz folklore (2004-2006, OSI), and archaic German dialects in the American Midwest (2005). Internationally she acts as a consultant on language documentation and multimedia annotation and archiving (International Metadata Initiative (IMDI), 2000; UNESCO ad hoc Endangered Language Committee Co-chair, 2002-2003; Electronic Metastructures in Endangered Language Data (EMELD), 2001-2006), and was co-organizer of the 2005 Digital Tools Summit in the Humanities at the University of Virginia, which in part inspired the current Summit.
